Jacob's Family Settles In Egypt

Genesis 47:1-31

Then Joseph went in and told Pharaoh, and said, "My father and my brothers and their flocks and their herds and all that they have, have come out of the land of Canaan; and behold, they are in the land of Goshen."² He took five men from among his brothers and presented them to Pharaoh.³ Then Pharaoh said to his brothers, "What is your occupation?" So they said to Pharaoh, "Your servants are shepherds, both we and our fathers."⁴ They said to Pharaoh, "We have come to sojourn in the land, for there is no pasture for your servants' flocks, for the famine is severe in the land of Canaan. Now, therefore, please let your servants live in the land of Goshen."⁵ Then Pharaoh said to Joseph, "Your father and your brothers have come to you."⁶ The land of Egypt is at your disposal; settle your father and your brothers in the best of the land, let them live in the land of Goshen; and if you know any capable men among them, then put them in charge of my livestock."⁷ Then Joseph brought his father Jacob and presented him to Pharaoh; and Jacob blessed Pharaoh.⁸ Pharaoh said to Jacob, "How many years have you lived?"⁹ So Jacob said to Pharaoh, "The years of my sojourning are one hundred and thirty; few and unpleasant have been the years of my life, nor have they attained the years that my fathers lived during the days of their sojourning."¹⁰ And Jacob blessed Pharaoh, and went out from his presence.¹¹ So Joseph settled his father and his brothers and gave them a possession in the land of Egypt, in the best of the land, in the land of Rameses, as Pharaoh had ordered.¹² Joseph provided his father and his brothers and all his father's household with food, according to their little ones.¹³ Now there was no food in all the land, because the famine was very severe, so that the land of Egypt and the land of Canaan languished because of the famine.¹⁴ Joseph gathered all the money that was found in the land of Egypt and in the land of Canaan for the grain which they bought, and Joseph brought the money into Pharaoh's house.¹⁵ When the money was all spent in the land of Egypt and in the land of Canaan, all the Egyptians came to Joseph and said, "Give us food, for why should we die in your presence? For our money is gone."¹⁶ Then Joseph said, "Give up your livestock, and I will give you food for your livestock, since your money is gone."¹⁷ So they brought their livestock to Joseph, and Joseph gave them food in exchange for the horses and the flocks and the herds and the donkeys; and he fed them with food in exchange for all their livestock that year.¹⁸ When that year was ended, they came to him the next year and said to him, "We will not hide from my lord that our money is all spent, and the cattle are my lord's. There is nothing left for my lord except our bodies and our lands."¹⁹ Why should we die before your eyes, both we and our land? Buy us and our land for food, and we and our land will be slaves to

For our money is gone."¹⁶ Then Joseph said, "Give up your livestock, and I will give you food for your livestock, since your money is gone."¹⁷ So they brought their livestock to Joseph, and Joseph gave them food in exchange for the horses and the flocks and the herds and the donkeys; and he fed them with food in exchange for all their livestock that year.¹⁸ When that year was ended, they came to him the next year and said to him, "We will not hide from my lord that our money is all spent, and the cattle are my lord's. There is nothing left for my lord except our bodies and our lands."¹⁹ Why should we die before your eyes, both we and our land? Buy us and our land for food, and we and our land will be slaves to

Discussion Questions Genesis 47:1-31

3. Why is Jacob’s desire to be buried in his home country (and Joseph’s promise to do so) important (verses 27-31)? How is God at work in all these experiences of this chapter to provide the One from Abraham’s seed who will take away sin (Genesis 3:15)?
